The editors of the Carbon & Climate Law Review (CCLR), an international journal dedicated to climate law and carbon markets, invite contributions for a forthcoming **Special Issue: 'International, Regional, and Local Perspectives on Law and Sea-Level Rise'**.

We welcome legal research addressing the following key themes:

· **Legal Statecraft:** e.g. How are states shaping international norms on sea-level rise to align with their interests and concerns?

· **Regional and Subregional Approaches:** e.g. What role do regional and subregional organisations play in responding to sea-level rise? How do legal instruments such as bilateral climate agreements, free movement agreements, and investment treaties contribute to these efforts?

· **Domestic Innovations:** e.g. What governmental and corporate policies are emerging to adapt to the impacts of sea-level rise? What lessons can be drawn from evolving national legislative and regulatory frameworks?

· **Climate litigation:** e.g. How is sea-level rise being addressed in cases brought before courts and other dispute settlement bodies? What legal consequences do climate-related decisions from courts and other bodies have on legal frameworks governing sea-level rise?

Potential subthemes include **statehood, the law of the sea, climate law, international economic law, migration and displacement law, human rights, rights of nature, and corporate responsibility.**

We invite the following types of contributions:

- **Articles:** 4,000–7,000 words (including footnotes)
- **Reports:** 1,000–3,500 words (including footnotes)
- **Book Reviews:** 1,000–3,000 words (including footnotes)

All submissions undergo a **double-blind peer review** and must comply with CCLR's author guidelines, available at www.lexxion.eu/cclr-authors.

The guest editors, Matteo Fermeglia, Heloisa Oliveira, and Aylin Yildiz Noorda, will oversee the editorial process and provide feedback.
