• Climate litigation: e.g. How is sea-level rise being addressed in cases brought before courts and other dispute settlement bodies? What legal consequences do climate-related decisions from courts and other bodies have on legal frameworks governing sea-level rise?

Potential subthemes include statehood, the law of the sea, climate law, international economic law, migration and displacement law, human rights, rights of nature, and corporate responsibility.

We invite the following types of contributions:

- Articles: 4,000-7,000 words (including footnotes)
 Reports: 1,000-3,500 words (including footnotes)
- · Book Reviews: 1,000-3,000 words (including footnotes)

All submissions undergo a double-blind peer review and must comply with CCLR's author guidelines, available at www.lexxion.eu/cclr-authors

The guest editors, Matteo Fermeglia, Heloisa Oliveira, and Aylin Yildiz Noorda, will oversee the editorial process and provide feedback.
